**Course description** 

Discipline of political science has evolved through the ideas of various philosophers. These ideas

were propounded by various thinkers in different parts of the world. This course is an attempt to make

students familiar with the political ideas of such thinkers. The course is divided into four units. The

first unit discusses two popular English thinkers: john Stuart Mill and Edmund Burk. Second unit

deals with world's most popular political philosopher Immanuel Kant. Third unit discusses another

idealist philosopher who influenced world's most radical ideology, Hegel. Finally the last unit deals

with two socialist thinkers, Karl Marx and Lenin.

**Course Objective** 

The objective of the paper is to acquaint the M.A students with the ideas of the following political

philosophers. The students will be introduced with those ideas as outlined from the critical perspective

so that they can understand, appreciate and reflect upon the importance of the ideas in the

contemporary society. The purpose is also to understand the thinkers in terms of being the larger part

of the society which have the direct bearing on the development of the ideas with greater depth and

societal relevance.
